Story of Doris and Lee Weick and Their Donation

As far as any recall in

my memory or any record I can find, Doris and Lee Weick gave to VUMC the largest one-time endowment in our history. On December 29, 2005, we received two checks from the estate totaling \$655,970.72. WOW. WOW. The checks were each for \$327.985.36. One check was to go to the church's General Fund and the other to The Leland Weick Scholarship Fund.

Normally, we would not make much mention of donations, but the story of Doris and Lee is so extraordinary and yet such an ordinary life and history in Vicksburg, I believe it deserves telling. *Especially for current and future recipients of the scholarship funds*. Would not each of us reading this be so happy to give so much money away after our deaths that would benefit so many people? Doris and Lee also gave substantial amounts to the Vicksburg Historical Society and the Library, to name a couple more, plus personal donations to those who had shown love and care for them in their last few years, and maybe others unknown by me.

Doris and Lee were the proprietors of the Doris-Lee Sweet Shop on Prairie Street in Vicksburg. They lived above the shop in an upstairs apartment until they built a very nice home on Sunset Lake, where they lived until they passed. They worked long hours, six days a week, with shorter hours on Sunday, because they had to get out the Sunday newspapers to homes in Vicksburg.

It was a favorite spot for those who wanted some homemade ice cream, which Lee made in a back room. All of us who were teenagers in the 1950's and 1960's remember their sodas, three grace sundaes, and malts. Lee told me once how you can tell high quality ice cream: "if you can chew it and it is not icy or all air." Plus, they had big bins of chocolates -- you could choose a few or a lot. Always a hard decision which one to buy. During this era, families came into Vicksburg on Friday and Saturday nights just to hang out, sprawled on

their cars and talk with friends. Of course, why not have an ice cream cone while you were hanging around outside. They had booths, and teenagers were welcome, but no hankiepankie. Vera Walker tells that she and hubbyto-be, Chuck, would go for treats, and Lee allowed them to hold hands. Nothing more. Doris and Lee's shop was also the stop for people waiting to catch the bus to Kalamazoo. A good place to shop while waiting. He was a bit stern and reserved, but who knows, maybe he knew teenagers, even though he and Doris had no children of their own. He ran a tight ship with the newspaper boys who worked for him, but everyone got their newspaper on time. My husband, J.R., was one of those boys.

In later years, they took out the ice cream and most of the candy bins. They gradually morphed into more of a fine gift shop. First in the area to have Hummel figurines, Hallmark cards and other popular "hot" items. They were savvy business people who knew how to, and were unafraid of, change. Upon their passing, they donated all the furniture, soda fountain, etc. to the Historical Society. Today there is a building on the grounds of the Historical Society bearing their name that houses all these old fashioned items. FUN!

What I am hoping to convey in this story and to scholarship recipients: You do not always have to be the best looking one in the room, the smartest one in the room, nor even the one who always seems to get all the lucky breaks! You do need to work hard and steady, stay inside your income (not outside), save a little for hard times, and who knows? You might just be the next Doris and Leland Weick who always had what they needed and still left some behind for others. I think God would approve, don't you? We, at VUMC, thank them from the bottom of our hearts.
